

The Myth of Modernity



GREENFLATION:

A Green Economy's Greatest Obstacle

The war on tackling Climate Change is being fought for a long time, ever since discovering holes in the ozone layer. Environmentalists and scientists have been trying to get Governments and Corporations onboard for a long time. Many viewed the pandemic as an opportunity to create a sustainable economy – a green economy that goes hand in hand with tackling climate change and saving the planet. Governments began to change their policy making in accordance with this target in mind. However, a new threat that can derail the green economy, Greenflation, has come into play.

Greenflation is the paradox that has emerged out of the climate change actions. As we push the efforts to attain a greener and cleaner economy, the associated costs rise, making the efforts expensive. This paradoxically prevents the world from achieving the goal to limit global warming and, thereby, climate change. But the globally overlooked factor is the crucial role fossil fuels and minerals will play in this green transition. Transitioning to a new energy source provides a big boost for the old one. The political and environmental regulations held back further investments in these areas, which has led to a decreased supply. The Oil Corporations have reinvented themselves as Clean Energy Corporations making investments in renewable energy. New mines that supply the essential minerals are not emerging.

Why this happened is because when governments around the world directed growth towards a greener economy, it caused a rise in demand for metals and fossil fuels required for the process while at the same time, they regulated the investments and supply chains in these areas. This created an unprecedented problem, "Greenflation," that drove up the prices formetals and minerals, especially copper, aluminum, and lithium essential for renewable technologies.

Latin America was a key supplier of these minerals. Chile and Peru together accounted for 40% of the total Copper production. Environmental, Social, and Governmental regulations in these countries have affected the supply chains of these minerals. The new regulations have delayed the operations of mines in these countries. Even China, the biggest commodity supplier of the international market, has cut down its production to reach carbon neutrality. Smelting was affected tremendously by China's decision on capping emissions, thereby putting a strain on Aluminium, a crucial metal for solar and green energy projects. These regulations and new policies to attain a greener economy have transformed into Greenflation, resisting it.

Production cuts during the pandemic and new environmental regulations with more countries aiming for a carbon-neutral state have fueled a demand-supply crisis. The present state of the global economy has fueled the inflation of prices for green technology. This has put the future of climate action change at stake. A sustainable society at the cost of rising inflation, at least during the initial stages of the transition, is what lies ahead for the world if the trend continues. Governments have to take the necessary actions to make a smoother transition by keeping up the necessary raw materials for the green energy transition. If Greenflation is not overcome, the inflationary effects will be huge on the monetary policies of central banks to the products for the consumption of the common man. Everyone has to realize that; the shutdown of the existing economy too fast makes the cost of a green economy unattainable.

Appealing Indian Market


Growth of E-commerce in The Middle East Market

MIDDLE EAST:

The Middle East is one of the most economically growing and rapidly developing regions. It is also the most people-centric region in the world. No matter which corner of the world one belongs from, they can often be found in the Middle East. Citing such development and diversification, it is logical and manipulative that the business boom in any region. Also, because the recent pandemic has forced one to stay at home, E-Commerce is the most profitable form of business for any company.

Apart from this, major brands like Gucci, Versace, H&M, and other similar ones, are pretty common and often worn apparel. Now that these are just a click away, it gets easier and more accessible for the business to make instant and rapid profits. Even before the pandemic, the Middle East market witnessed a whopping \$16 bn sales profit. This was such a figure which was not even anticipated from the market. There are around 4.44 million active shoppers in the region who contribute even to the smallest of fractions.

 Soug has been a competitive E-Commerce market even compared to the Giant, Amazon. However, in 2017, Amazon spent \$580 million and acquired Soug to stay in the market and gain a formidable position in the Middle East region.

AFRICA:

The African business market may not have a reputation for various businesses; however, it is over and above any other market in E-Commerce. The E-Commerce market value is around \$20 billion annually. This is less than the value of a country like Australia. However, the population in Africa is growing fast, and hence the demographics will tend more towards the younger generation mostly. Also, the African market presents a vast opportunity in E-Commerce because the countries Kenya and Uganda were the first to introduce mobile payments, and it has been prominent since. Therefore, mobile payments are proving to be the frontrunner for the E-Commerce segment.

More than 30 percent of consumers surveyed in Nigeria and Kenya said they are shopping online more frequently amid the pandemic. In South Africa, where ecommerce sales were forecast to more than double in 2020,64 percent of consumers made their first online grocery purchase, and 53 percent bought goods from an online pharmacy for the first time. Meanwhile, online marketplace Jumia, which operates in several African countries, reported a 22.8 percent on-year increase in active consumers in the nine months to September 2020.



 The E-Commerce Giant in Africa is Jumia, which captures almost 60% of the African E-Commerce market.

The Middle East and African regions are evergreen to an E-Commerce business. Any company that has a venture of starting up an E-Commerce vertical can look at the Middle East and Africa as a potential and forever growing opportunity.

Most probably, your answer would NEVER be!


Now let me ask another question: when was the last time you were out to buy PCs, Air conditioners, Automobiles, Television, refrigerators, etc.

Your probable answer, not so long a while ago.

And, when did you last withdraw your hard-earned cash from ATMs? Not a big deal; you do it on a regular basis, right.

Exactly, you may never explicitly use semiconductor chips regularly, but every time you use your PCs, Cell-phones, Washing machines, ATMs, there are semiconductor chips quietly doing jobs inside the devices.





From being a pivotal element of machine sensors to miniaturizing the size of electronic devices, chips are making our lives easier, making the world a better place to live in!

And with next-generation technologies such as Artificial intelligence, machine learning, and IOT becoming parts and parcels of our lives, Semiconductor chip demand is rising faster than expected.

But, here comes the sad news: Chips are not available to meet demand!

Why is it so?

We will come to that later; let's first see the origins of semiconductor chips.

The most primitive form of the semiconductor chip, a transistor, was developed at Bell Labs, New Jersey, the US, making way for its inventors John Bardeen, Walter Brattain, and William Shockley to grab a Nobel prize in physics in 1956.

What we use these days is an advanced version of the same semiconductor chips. Let's come back where we left, So why is there a chip shortage.

The answer is unexpected rising demand and the strategic nature of the chips.

These unexpected rising demands are fueled by -

- COVID-19 induced remote working culture leading to the higher electronic gadgets usages.
- The rise in applications of electronic components in automobiles.
- Rapid progress in the automation of businesses around the globe.

So, why are we not producing enough chips?

As a matter of fact, It is easier said than done.

Semiconductor chips annual trade value is above 400 Billion US dollars. Chips are such a new-age technology that no country or corporation wants to share any recent breakthroughs with others for the very strategic reason to keep strategic control over this new oil!

Moreover, It requires a lot of investment to the value of 4 to 6 Billion US dollars to build a moderate capacity chip manufacturing facility.

That amount is so high that it even exceeds the budgets of many countries; for instance, Nepal and Zimbabwe's total budget is almost 6 Billion and 3 Billion US dollars, respectively.

China, despite investing more than 150 Billion US dollars, is still far from making competitive semiconductor chips and hence imports it to the tune of 300 Billion US dollars owing to the fact that the recent pioneering chip technology is such a hard-nut-to-crack that only a few countries possess it. And, the US-China diplomatic rift is making the situation worse as the US and its partners South Korea and Taiwan are more conscious than ever lest this prized technology slip into the hands of their rival china.

When the oil crisis had hit, the petrol bunk he had leased from Shell was returned.

The second anecdote would be on LEGO. For many, this might have been a birthday present or something of great value for children that triggered fun with logic and thinking at the same time. The idea of building blocks was there a long time back by Kiddiecraft. But the entire idea of wooden building blocks initially had come through because of the strenuous task of raising children after his wife had died due to a medical condition. To keep the kids engaging, he started with the concept of wooden toys left over after the fire that caused to destroyed his business. That worked out, and people across Denmark wanted cheap and affordable toys for their children during World War II. A wise market opportunity used at the right time paved the way towards the right path.

But that did not prove well for long. The great depression had begun. His business had a second fire to add fuel to the fire when a large mall from Denmark gave his elder son an order for toys for the Christmas season ahead. But he made a choice and started delivering goods on his own. Another aspect he discovered soon is that the toy market had started to fill with toys made of plastic which was the future then. A market opportunity discovered was enhanced to its fullest potential. A new

horizon for LEGO was built through LEGO System that had a few pieces and required the children to assemble it and enjoy the toy. This proved well.



PANDEMIC AND THE BOOM OF INFLUENCER MARKETING



The Pandemic has Shaken the world. It has impacted all the sectors of the economy. Still, it also has become a blessing in disguise to the influencers out there, reinforcing influencer marketing and bringing in a cutting-edge marketing strategy. From small-scale Instagram businesses to branded companies like Nike, Pepsi, Adidas, it has explored its possibilities and started investing in them.

While looking at the statistics, last year, almost 59 percent of the global ad spend was used for digital marketing as the overall ad sales have dropped considerably. 49 percent of the consumers depend on the influencer recommendation, and 45 percent of the women have been more active on social media for the past two years than before. The purchase intent of people when products are recommended by an influencer over a celebrity is also observed to be very high. According to studies, businesses are ready to increase their budget for influencer marketing to a higher level due to the incredible results they have been obtaining in the past two years. The return on investment in influencer marketing has also surpassed print marketing. All this made the brands rethink their marketing strategy, and 67 percent of the firms have actively used influencer marketing in the last two years.

The restriction in physical activities due to prolonged lockdowns has added to the increase in screentime of people. It almost doubled the screentime of people, which eventually helped such influencers as their content received more visibility. Most of the big brands had to reschedule or cancel their shoots and other marketing activities and depend on the influencers for creating content for marketing. People found their content more relatable and trustworthy than any random celebrity engaging with a brand. According to surveys, the chance of people buying a product is far more when marketed by an influencer than any celebrity. All these points have contributed to this boom. The micro-influencers (influencers with less than 25k followers) and small businesses which run online have mutually helped each other in their growth.

Going forward, the influencing market Is assumed to be growing on a larger scale than the previous years. With the budget allocated to digital marketing increasing each year than the conventional marketing, there is a huge scope in the field. The better return on investment is an attraction for the brands. But at the same time, all this depends on people's trust in such influencers. Suppose poor quality content or paid collaborations that give fake reviews are provided to people eventually. In that case, they will start questioning the authenticity of such recommendations, affecting the overall structure of such marketing techniques. The disparity between the influencer's content engagement increases and the ad sales not improving when compared to it needs to be studied as well. As the world adjusts to the new normal when offline works and classes start, the amount of screentime can also reduce, and this can cause a reduction in content consumption. Even though these are some of the challenges to think about, the future of influencer marketing looks very bright if it can be overcome through very productive planning and execution.

With the world still recovering from Covid, in October 2021, the National Crime Records Bureau published a shocking statistic. According to official figures, India lost more people to suicide in 2020 - 1.53 lakh than Covid- 19, which took 1.46 lakh lives last year. In this, almost a quarter of the victims were daily wage labourers; more than 10,000 victims were students.

In a nation like India, where mental health is still considered taboo, the government has yet to prevent the loss of human capital due to peer pressure and social taboo. The economic cost of mental disorders is more than 4% of our GDP.

Mental illnesses have recently been identified as the gateway to many aspects hindering sustainable development. It is determined to affect educational attainment, income, nutrition, housing, and social support; it is aggravated by civil unrest, looming wars, and natural disasters, which may be influenced by climate change. Its burden, again, disproportionately affects women and girls, limiting their opportunities to go to school and earn a living. There is a cyclical relationship between poverty and mental illness. Between 2011-2030, mental illness will cost the global economy USD 16 trillion in lost economic output— more than cancer, diabetes, and respiratory diseases combined.

Mental illness is a leading cause of the global burden of disease. Mental illness causes more years lived with disability (32.4%) than any other health condition and nearly as many disability-adjusted life-years

(13.0%) as cardiovascular disease (13.5%). People living with mental illness are also more likely to develop physical health problems and have poorer physical health outcomes, including higher premature mortality rates.

Mental health is addressed in SDG 3 – "Good health and well-being." SDG 3.4 calls for reducing premature mortality from non-communicable diseases through prevention and treatment and promoting mental health and well-being. It includes the reduction of suicide mortality and treatment of persons affected with mental illness.

Cost-effective solutions to mental health care exist. Studies have also identified that mental health can be improved through development interventions beyond the health sector. However, mental health is too often sidelined by international development. This must change. Mental health also needs to be addressed to achieve Sustainable development goals.

NGOs and academia need to maintain momentum and hold the UN to account as guardians of the SDGs. Lastly, the UN member states need to commit to their 2030 agenda promise to leave no one behind and ensure prevention, treatment, and inclusion within universal health coverage for people with mental disorders and psychosocial disabilities.

Small Data - Really?

One has to be living on a different planet to not hear about the term Big Data, It is so ubiquitous that every third article on technology contains some mention of Big Data. What exactly is big data, and how big does data have to be to qualify as Big Data? Big Data is big owing to its magnitude and speed of accumulation. Popularly known as the four V's: Volume, Variety, Velocity, and Veracity are the components of a framework that can be used to comprehend Big Data. Volume indicates the vastness of the data in length and depth; variety would mean the multiplicity of the data type (text, numbers, image, audio, and so on); velocity implies the speed at which data is generated and piled up, and veracity denotes the quality of data that will be analyzed. Imagine the water level in an infinite capacity reservoir that constantly increases with high speed, including a mix of minerals, some of which are useful to us. This is Big Data.

If there exists big data, then there may be small data as well. If big data is infinitely big, how small is small data? There is no consensus about the smallness of data. But how small a data can get - a text, a number, a sound, a symbol, a pixel, a nod could all be small data. In short, small data is the next best thing to no data. But that remains just that - a data that cannot be further understood without any supporting entities. Small data cannot be that small - it has to be the smallest meaningful unit at a minimum. Arguing dichotomously, anything that is not big data can be small data. That is again not wholly true. Hence the smallness of data cannot be understood with a specific framework. Nevertheless, we can assert that small data should be big enough to generate any meaningful insight and small enough that it can be captured, managed, and comprehended in a relatively easy manner. In his book Small Data, Martin Lindstrom says that data generated from a single person can be small data.

Conceptualizing Small Data

Small Data is highly contextdependent. For a street vendor, a customer's gaze is a small data that reveals a potential interest in a product; for a teacher,

a student's vawn in the classroom is a small data; for a child, a rolled eye by the parent is a small data. But for a rational decision making process, small data should be more than just one bit. It has to be large enough to offer enough insight that can be revealed from the data. The properties of Big Data can be assumed for the small data as well, in letters but not in the same spirit. Small Data also needs to be sufficiently large (volume), accumulated at regular and manageable intervals (velocity), should have different components of data (variety), and should hide within it meaningful insights that can be drawn by analyzing (veracity). A vat of water drawn from the imaginary infinite reservoir of big data can be a metaphor for small data. The vat size depends on the context on which the analysis is carried out. In a quantifiable sense, a dataset containing up to 1000 rows or columns can be considered small data. A rule of thumb is that a person should be able to make some preliminary inferences just by reading through the data. If any inference, albeit superficial can be drawn from a given dataset that can be said as small data. Another angle is that one need not have to have sophisticated high performance software to work on small data. A spreadsheet with any standard office package would suffice for small data analysis.

Small data concentrates more on depth, rather than breadth of the insights. It offers a focused insight that can be derived from a dataset and mainly for a single purpose. What small data lacks is standardization, both in form and storage.



In an organization, different departments may store the same data in various manifestations. It may be tucked away in an employee's personal computer or cloud, which may never be explored for insights. These small chunks of data hold potentially relevant information. But by virtue of being small, it may be deemed unimportant and may be overlooked by analysts. This micro storage of data implies high dependence on the individual who maintains such data, and the interpretations will often be mired with subjectivity.

Small Data can be Smart Data

Choosing to include or incorporate only what is relevant and vital for further decision making can make your data small and smart. There is no beating around the proverbial bush, no superficial understanding. Instead, what small data offers is a smart analysis. Do not approach small data as another jargon to be tamed and added on to your 'must-know' kitty. It's happening right now. Deep dive into your computer hard drive or cloud storage; there are a lot of hidden stories in it. Streamline them, connect the dots, and voila!! You get a picture.

So, what are you planning to do with the small data you are sitting on right now?

ECOCRITICISM, A LAYMAN'S PERSPECTIVE: A NOTE

Recently, there has been observed an increasing awareness within business communities on the significance of going green and adopting various environment management techniques. As the corporate world is going global, the business is experiencing a shift from a conventional financial structure to a modern capacitybased economy that is ready to explore green economic facets of a business. The manufacturing cycle, right from Marketing (Research) to Manufacturing and back to Marketing (sales), and the chain from Marketing to Consumers, have begun to adopt green practices. Integration of green practices is widely seen in marketing, human resources practices, manufacturing supply chain, etc., leading to the development of sustainable indices in the manufacturing process. The corporates are adopting or persuaded to adopt or mandated to adopt environmentally friendly practices that would make the world a better place to live in. Corporates adopt villages as part of their corporate social responsibility to improve the prospects of irrigation, to improve the water quality, to improve the groundwater level, and so on.

While science, engineering, and technology all contribute to making the globe both polluted as well to clean up the mess it created, Humanities is not lagging behind too when compared with its science compatriot in promoting environmentally friendly practices.

Science, engineering, and technology all contribute towards the quantitative measurement of environmental degradation, techniques of measuring the pollution (some of the pollutions could be irreparable), and trying to achieve a net-zero carbon emission.

Humanities, on the other hand, discusses how the human (humane?) centric (Anthropocene) approaches create environmental hazards, imbalances in the weather, seasonal changes, and the damages and havocit causes.

Environmental Humanities, otherwise also known as Ecocriticism, analyse (criticize?) the literature that discusses nature, the change that has occurred in nature, seasons. the rise in temperature, sea levels, glacier melts, and so on over the period time. The objective of these analyses and critical views is to bring about a change in the behavior of the globe, countries, governments, industries, and individuals if we choose to fix the responsibility in a topbottom approach. Ecocriticism has extended itself into the different areas of humanities such as culture, religion studies, films, gender studies, postcolonial studies, psychology, etc. The theoretical contributions of gender studies and postcolonial studies are worth mentioning.

Ecocriticism began to develop as an area of interest in 1962 (Silent Spring), as an area of study in 1992(Association for the study of Literature and Environment), as an area of research in 1993 (Interdisciplinary Studies in Literature and Environment). Lawrence Buell, in his The Environmental Imagination, formulated a checklist of four 'ingredients' of an environmentally orientated work:

- The nonhuman environment is present not merely as a framing device but as a presence that begins to suggest that human history is implicated in natural history.
- Human interest is not understood to be the only legitimate interest.
- Human accountability to the environment is part of the text's ethical orientation.
- Some sense of the environment as a process rather than as a constant or a given is at least implicit in the text.

Waves of Ecocriticism

Ecocriticism as a theoretical area of research evolved during 1993. It discussed the effects of post-industrialisation. Lamenting about the loss of greenery, puddle-laden tarred roads, smoke, and the loss of serenity. It was primarily confined to the core English literature and poetries (Notable among the contributors is Gary Sander).

They tended to equate the environment with nature. Focused on literary renditions of the natural world in poetry. The poetry displayed the place affinity of humans (similar to cats!) at a bio regional level. This is classified as the first wave in the literatures.

The region which was the initial affinity now began to enlarge during the 2000s with globalisation, growth of multinational companies, transnational borders of industrialisation that searched for the scale of operations. The ecocriticism literature now began to evince interest that pertained to metropolis and industrialisation—evolved from being biocentric to socio centric—moved from regional level to global level. The literatures refer to this period as the second wave.

Scott Slovic and Joni Adamson hailed the arrival of ecocriticism's third wave in 2009 - a development which "recognises ethnic and national particularities and yet transcends ethnic and national boundaries," exploring "all facets of human experience from an environmental viewpoint." Broadly speaking, this describes the paradigm of eco-cosmopolitics.


The third wave, in my opinion, has not just transcended ethnic and national boundaries; it also evolved and extended into other areas of humanities, especially ecofeminism and postcolonial studies. Ecofeminism assumes the environment as a woman, and the ones that destroy the environment are construed as men out to dominate and create a patriarchal society. So far, the Anglophonic works were given importance, and the regional works were marginalized for their contribution to the cause of the environment. During the third wave, the works (authors) of the colonized countries began to obtain their dues (Arundathi Roy, Amitav Ghosh, etc.) In Sense of Place and Sense of Planet: The Environmental Imagination of the Global (2008), Ursula Heise remotely talks about cultural imagination and understanding that reach beyond the nation and around the globe.

Now, the buzz is about The Fourth Wave - Material Ecocriticism that discusses Post-Human and Post-Nature (Bruno Latour's We Have Never Been Modern) In order to understand the evolution and the current focus area of the research in ecocriticism, chose three major works that were published in 2011, 2013, and 2016. A word cloud was constructed for each of the works:

Inferences

Based on the word clouds, the following inferences are made.

- Ecocriticism seems, in my opinion, to be a fledgling branch of research. More into literary than into theoretical academic contribution
- The evolution has taken multiple dimensions, such as ecofeminism postcolonial ecocriticism, thereby lacking focus.
- Ecocriticism lacks scientific temper as well as quantitative analysis.
- The development of adequate theories that are found in other branches of humanities disciplines seems to be lacking.
- The perspective of geography, history, race, politics, culture, gender ecology, ethics, religious studies, anthropology all has an intersection with the environment.

- Thus, horizontal expansion of the research is growing while vertical expansion seems to be lacking.
- While ample qualitative analysis is available, the theoretical contributions to the academic studies seem limited.
- The analysis thus made exists in isolation rather than integrated.

I conclude this note with a Sanskrit verse:



The Freedom of Assange


they tried so hard to keep hidden from the public.


To quote George Orwell, from his book

India records 80 murders, 77 rape cases daily in the 2020 National Crime Record Bureau's (NCRB) report. 77 rape cases were reported across India on an average daily in 2022, totaling 28,046 such incidents during the year 2019. Overall, 3,71,503 cases of crime against women were reported across the country in 2019, showing a decline of 8.3 % as 4,05,326 cases were registered in 2019, the NCRB stated.

As per the NCRB data, Rajasthan reported the highest number of rapes (5310) in India in 2020, followed by Uttar Pradesh with 2769 cases, Madhya Pradesh with 2339 cases, and Maharashtra, 2061 cases. Major crime heads under crime against children during 2020 were kidnapping and abduction (42.6 %) and protection of children from sexual offenses act 2012 (38.8%), including childrape



In just last week in the Thane district of Maharashtra, a new rape case showed up. A 15-year-old girl was raped by 33 people for 9 months. Can you imagine the cruelty of this act, the animalistic behavior of human nature? A 15-year-old girl, maybe in her 10th class, was raped by so many people and all this happened because she met one guy on social media, and that guy raped her and recorded the video and threatened her with that video. The question arises why she didn't speak about this to her parents? What

Yet another alarm bell, act now on Western Ghats

According to a new assessment by the International Union for Conservation of Nature (IUCN), India's famed Western Ghats, designated as a natural world heritage site by UNESCO in 2012, are under the threat of population pressure, urbanisation, and climate change. The most recent IUCN World Heritage Outlook builds on earlier studies from 2014 and 2017 to assess whether conservation of the world's 252 natural world heritage sites is sufficient to ensure their long-term protection.

The Western Ghats Mountain chain, is recognized as one of the world's eight "hottest hotspot" places of biological diversity, according to UNESCO's 2020 study. If a site's conservation outlook is a cause for concern, its values are thought to be threatened by a number of present and/or potential risks, necessitating significant extra conservation efforts in the medium to long term to protect these assets.



Some important observations of the report are:

The fact that so much biodiversity remains in the Western Ghats, given the tremendous population pressure both within and surrounding the property, is extraordinary. A large number of threats, which severely threaten the outstanding universal value of the world heritage property, exist and require coordinated conservation responses at all levels including political, sociological and biological (IUCN report)." "Urbanisation together with agricultural expansion, livestock grazing and forest fragmentation



are also posing serious threats to the species and habitats of the Western Ghats. Climate change will probably exacerbate a system already under pressure and has the potential to impact on the large-scale monsoonal processes, which influence the Western Ghats (IUCN report).

Politically, the entire Western Ghats is extremely difficult to protect and manage given the large number of different stakeholders operating in the area, the complexity of governance arrangements and the fact that 40 per cent of the original forests have already been destroyed (IUCN Report). Functional corridors that ensure wildlife mobility between protected areas are needed, according to the report, and this is a major gap in the conservation situation in the Western Ghats and India in general. Although corridors have been identified, no continuous and earnest efforts to construct them have been made. The Ariankavu corridor between the Periyar and Agasthyamalai landscapes is one such example in the Western Ghats, according to the report. The site's protection and management issues are exacerbated by high population pressure and the need for growth, as well as the site's management's apparent lack of integration with broader national, state, and local development plans, states the report.

The Western Ghats Mountain range, which is older than the Himalayas, contains geomorphic features of tremendous importance, as well as distinct biophysical and biological processes. The Indian monsoon weather pattern is influenced by the sites' high montane forest eco systems. The site, which helps to moderate the region's tropical temperature, is one of the

best examples of the monsoon system on the planet.

The site's woodlands, according to UNESCO, contain some of the best non-equatorial tropical evergreen forests anywhere, as well as at least 325 globally vulnerable flora, animal, bird, amphibian, reptile, and fish species.



Warning Bells

Kerala, Karnataka, and Tamil Nadu have been hammered by torrential rains for four years in a row now, resulting in landslides and floods. While it definitely has an influence on life, livelihood, and the economy, the cause is human-caused climate change. There is an irony here. Human activity seeks to keep populations afloat by improving living conditions through infrastructure development. However, programmes that harm the environment cause climate change. This manifests itself by wreaking havoc on the exact human conditions that are being attempted to better.

The fragile Western Ghats is being eved for more infrastructure projects. The impact is seen in massive landslides in the Malanad region, besides flooding and washing away of roads in most of the region. The effects of climate change are seen not just in one region, but from Uttarakhand and Assam to Kerala and Maharashtra, with people suffering land and crop losses for years, forcing them to shut production and shift to urban areas. The devastating floods in Europe and China, besides the wildfires in Australia, Brazil and the US, have set alarm bells ringing more than ever before. Studies at the Divecha Centre for Climate Change (at IISc Bengaluru) time and again indicate that the water-holding capacity in the atmosphere increases by 7% with each

degree rise in atmospheric temperature, thus causing an increase in rainfall.

Writing on the wall: Infrastructure projects are destroying Western Ghats


The time to put off the inevitable question about human relationship to nature is long past. Our assumption that we can control and modify nature without repercussions is a fallacy.

Elevated mountains that touch the blue skies, delicate slopes clothed in thick tropical timberlands and evergreen valleys - the Western Ghats sustain an assortment of biological systems not found in any other portion of the world. Spread over 164,280 square kilometres, these mountain ranges cultivate assortments of endemic plants, creatures, fowls and reptiles. The streams that cascade down the mountains into the valleys underneath — the Godavari. Tungabhadra, Bhima, Tapi and Cauvery are imperative for the survival of about 245 million individuals in Peninsular India. The devastation of these woodlands, be that as it may, through uncontrolled plunder of characteristic assets, ill-considered foundation ventures and unpredictable advancement of tourism, devastate a biosphere seen as an organic hotspot.

We will go through some of these projects to gauge the ferocity of irreversible damage caused to the Western Ghats.



Sharavathi Valley Hydro Power Plant: -Even though river Sharavathi hosts 7 other projects which already provide close to 40 percent (1,470 MW) of hydropower generated in Karnataka, Karnataka Power Corporation Limited (KPCL) is yet again going ahead with another 5,000 crore



underground pumped hydropower project on it directly impacting at least 360 acres of forest land rich in flora and fauna which might lead to endangering one of the last existing habitats of the endangered liontailed macaque species.

Yettinahole Stream Diversion Project:
- Another project in Karnataka that aims to divert approximately 672 billion litres of water off the Yettinahole stream, a major tributary of Netravathi river, to provide for the water needs of the people in Bengaluru region. The project falls in eco-sensitive area as identified by Kasturirangan report (an expert panel formed on Western Ghats). A major chunk of forest would be lost in constructing the Rs 13,000-crore project, which has been criticised by environmentalists as an unnecessary project with the availability of other sustainable options.

Kaiga Nuclear Plant Expansion: - The spree of environment damaging projects continues in Karnataka. Kaiga Nuclear Plant in Mallapura is being expanded at the cost of massive ecological damage to the Western Ghats wiping out at least 60 hectares of forest land. Even though the region has seen massive protest by activists and locals, the

administration has not paid heed to them as they deliberately shy away from protecting the fragile ecosystem, the environment, and the forests, for fulfilling the so-called electricity needs of the society.

Highway Expansions: - Widening of NH4A connecting Belgaum in Karnataka to Goa is expected to impact at least 82 kms long stretch of Western Ghats. An NHAI estimate suggests the expansion would lead to cutting 22,000 trees, even though local activists claim the number to be around 1.00.000.

Hubballi Ankola Railway Project: - Another project proposed in Karnataka (approved in 2020) that environmentalists claim could lead to massive deforestation, and subsequently desertification of ecosensitive swathes of land as a 164 km long railway line is built cutting through deep forests in the Western Ghats.

Kozhikode-Wayanad tunnel road: The 7 km long tunnel road cuts through
highly sensitive forests and hills of the
Western Ghats, impacting the elephant
corridor between Wayanad and Nilgiri Hills
in Tamil Nadu. The region has seen massive
landslides in 2019. Citing the need for the

tunnel, the lawmakers have ignored the environmentalists' call for abandoning the project.

Athirappilly hydel project: - Much opposed by environmental activists, tribal organizations, the now-abandoned 163 MW hydroelectric project proposed to be built on the Chalakudy river basin in Thrissur district, would have led to the cutting of more than 15,000 giant trees damaging one of the most biodiverse and the only riverine forest in the state.

Ecological crisis: The brunt of this plunder is borne by the people living in the biosphere. Each passing year, the monsoon brings in its wake floods and landslides that destroy crops, houses and properties. However, governments every year keep on adding new projects in the garb of economic necessity, society's need, even though many peer-reviewed reports have shown that these needs, or the so-called benefits are exaggerated to benefit vested interests.

What was started by the British are being continued by us even more vigorously, all in the name of development, and economic growth. The way we are informed about these projects through different modes of communication, our minds are manipulated to think of them as a necessity that must be achieved as soon as possible, without any consideration for the permanent damage that these projects would cost to one of the most sensitive biodiversity hotspots in the world.

Much needed recommendations of the Gadgil Committee were side-lined as state governments, and pressure groups continue to move ahead with working for short term political and economic gains. One of the most important recommendations of the committee includes restricting any sort of development activity, including building dams, in the most eco-sensitive zone identified as ESZ-1. Both Athirapally hydro-project of Kerala and Gundia hydel project fall in ESZ-1 and should not be realized. Even though Kerala government has given in to pressure from environmental activists and locals, Karnataka government is proceeding further with the project, showing utter disregard for the recommendations. Likewise, other important ecommendations have been projected by rmafias and vested interests as anti-farmer, anti-development leading to gullible people protesting the Gadgil Committee recommendations by burning effigies of Prof. Madhav Gadgil.

Rare nudging by the High Courts and the Supreme Court to act on protecting the forests in the ecologically sensitive Western Ghats is not enough to stop this madness in the name of development. But what is the solution? What should we do? Given that we have already lost 40% of the Western Ghats, should we just give up and accept the fact that we are doomed?

The answer is No. Losing hope is not the solution. Montreal Protocol is a perfect example of how we can undo the damage caused to the environment by being more responsible and by taking concrete actions to undo our past wrongs.

It is us, the people, the civil society members, and the environmental activists who need to vociferously inform the masses, run massive campaigns, and raise funds to educate the common people about the need to protect the environment, the forests, the wildlife, the flora and fauna, and the biodiversity that we have inherited from the nature. Being aware of the repercussions of climate change, of building unnecessary projects deep down in these hotspots, etc., would in turn help us reflect on our actions, on our meek acceptance of the damage done to the forests, leading to a united opposition and action plan to undo the damage by taking much needed ameliorative steps to protect our cherished pride, our Western Ghats.



Social Engineering Attacks

Social Engineering is the term used for a broad range of malicious activities accomplished through human interactions.

It uses psychological manipulation to trick users into making security mistakes or giving away sensitive information.

Baiting

Baiting attacks use a false promise to pique a victim's greed or curiosity. They lure users into a trap that steals their personal information or inflicts their systems with malware.

For example, attackers leave the bait-typically malware-infected flash drives-in conspicuous areas where potential victims are certain to see them (e.g., bathrooms, elevators, the parking lot of a targeted company).

Online forms of baiting consist of enticing ads that lead to malicious sites or that encourage users to download a malware-infected application.

Scareware

Scareware involves victims being bombarded with false alarms and fictitious threats.
Users are deceived to think their system is infected with malware, prompting them to install software that has no real benefit (other than for the perpetrator) or is malware itself.

A common scareware example is the legitimatelooking popup banners appearing in your browser while surfing the web, displaying such text such as, "Your computer may be infected with harmful spyware programs."

It either offers to install the tool (often malware-infected) for you, or will direct you to a malicious site where your computer becomes infected.

Pretexting

Here an attacker obtains information through a series of cleverly crafted lies.

The scam is often initiated by a perpetrator pretending to need sensitive information from a victim so as to perform a critical task.



The attacker usually starts by establishing trust with their victim by impersonating coworkers, police, bank and tax officials, or other persons who have right-to-know authority. The pretexter asks questions that are ostensibly required to confirm the victim's identity, through which they gather important personal data.

Phishing

Phishing scams are email and text message campaigns aimed at creating a sense of urgency, curiosity or fear in victims. It then prods them into revealing sensitive information, clicking on links to malicious websites, or opening attachments that contain malware.

Spear Phishing

This is a more targeted version of the phishing scam whereby an attacker chooses specific individuals or enterprises. They then tailor their messages based on characteristics, job positions, and contacts belonging to their victims to make their attack less conspicuous.



Time is a beautiful concept, it turned me into a believer. for I was once crude and inept, with all the tenderness undercover


Now when we brace our fingers, my heart slowly repose The warmth of yours, lingers, even after the grip is at lose

Wisdom Quest was a weekly quiz that focused on a new theme each week. Questions was put up as our stories on all of our social media handles daily relating to business.


Motivational Grid
